Mon-Tues Aug. 15-16	2 practices – Helmets, non-contact, no protective pads, no mechanical blocking devices. Use of cones, ladders, step-over dummies, soft hand shields and similar devices as teaching aids is permissible.
Wednesday, Aug 17	Mandatory Rules Interpretation - Coaches Meeting (No Modified coaches) @ 7pm at Jamesville-Dewitt High School. All section III football schools must be in attendance!
Wed-Thurs-Fri Aug 17-19	Days 3, 4 & 5 - Transition period. Shoulder pads with blocking devices permitted. Player to Player talking drills team scrimmaging and full contact is prohibited.
Sat-Fri. Aug 20-26	Days 6-12 - full contact, full protective equipment and use of “Training devices.” (Sleds, etc.)
Fri. Aug. 26	Deadline date to mail rosters, schedules and Football Facilities Form (Page 21) to all opponents, Divisional Coach and AD Reps.
Sat. Aug 27	First Interschool scrimmage date (players must have 11 individual practices)
Fri. Sept. 2	First game date (players must have 15 individual practices)
Sat. Oct. 1	Deadline date to mail picture and roster (Page 23) to the Section 3 tournament program book.
Sun Oct. 16	Deadline date to send “Playing a ninth game” form (Page 23)
Sun Oct. 16	All Coaches should arrive at 1pm @ Time Warner for Football Meeting to set up Section 3 Quarterfinals and 8 th week games (Note: all coaches must be present or send an assistant coach and must bring 2 most recent game films to this meeting. Committee Members arrive at 11AM .)

Football Committee Operations Guidelines

(Rev. 1986, 87, 88, 89, 90, 91, 92, 93, 99, 01, 02, 03, 04, 05, 06, 07, 08, 09,10, 11)

PURPOSE:

1. To enable a new member to know his responsibilities.
2. To enable all schools to know what procedure the football committee is following with the intent to avoid misunderstanding and to open up a smooth means of communications.

CHAIRMAN:

1. Selected by Section 3 president.
2. Duties:
 - a. Schedule meetings on a regular basis or call meetings if necessary.
 - b. Deal with news media.
 - c. Attend state and section 3 meetings involving football.
 - d. Coordinate Sub Committees for:
 - Officials Coordination – Paul Muench
 - Championship Tournament – Tom Tatham, George Mangicaro, Ari Liberman, Mike Deuel, Mike Stevens, John Dippold
 - Arcaro Classic “All Star” Games – Paul Sealy and Tom LaDuke Coordinators
 - Scheduling – Kevin DeParde – Coordinator
 - Scheduling – **A.D. and Coaches** Reps for each class
 - JV Scheduling – Mike Byrnes and Chris Doroshenko - Coordinator
 - Kickoff Classic Games – Paul Sealy – Coordinator
 - 9th game coordinator – Keith Kempney
 - Facilitate division alignment meetings each year.
 - e. Develop, print and distribute updated handbook each year.
 - f. Has the right to make on the spot decisions for the committee if there is **NO TIME** to call a meeting.
 - g. Report to Section 3 Officers and the Athletic Council on committee work.

REPRESENTATIVES:

1. Athletic Director Representatives. Selected by majority vote of the people they represent. One chosen by each section 3 football divisions as listed in the Section 3 Handbook. Duties:
 - a. Attend all meetings, including post-season class meetings. If unable to attend send well-informed AD or call chairman in advance with input.
 - b. Discuss agenda issues with AD’s in your league prior to FB meetings.
 - c. Come to committee meetings with information gathered from those you represent.
 - d. Actively serve on sub committee as designated by the chair.
 - e. Intervene with a school in your league when football bylaws have been broken (step 1).

REPRESENTATIVES (Continued):

2. Coaching Representatives. Selected at division post-season year-end meeting by divisional coaches. Selected by majority vote of the people they represent.

Duties:

- a. Attend all meetings. If unable to attend send well informed substitute coach or call chairman in advance with input.
- b. Discuss agenda issues with coaches in your league prior to FB meetings.
- c. Come to committee meetings with information gathered from those you represent.
- d. Actively serve on sub committee as designated by the chair.
- e. Inform by email, phone or in person all coaches in your division of film exchange responsibilities one week prior to the sectional/position game meeting.
- f. Meet with division coaches at least twice per year.

Before Season:

- To communicate changes in rules and bylaws.
- To set up a system of reporting weekly statistics to newspapers.
- To exchange game dates and times.
- To inform coaches of dates and deadlines.

Post Season:

- To select all stars and send to newspapers.
 - Select “coach of the year” from your division.
 - Generate recommendations for the All CNY team and big 50 team.
 - Elect a rep. for the next year.
 - Generate concerns to forward to the FB committee.
- g. Send copies of meeting minutes to division coaches and chair.
 - h. Submit a season year-end report to the chair. (Page 28)
 - i. Keep track of tiebreaker and wild card points for your division. Make report at staging meeting for section playoffs and positioning tourney.
 - j. Contact coaches involved in post season play to have them bring their last two game films to post-season seeding meeting for film exchange **MANDATORY**.

3. Head Football coach or AD must attend all division meeting or send a well-informed representative for voting purposes.

SUB COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Championship Sub Committee:
 - a. Plan and coordinate all aspects of the Section 3 and Regional Games.
 - b. Facilitate staging meetings before all sectional and regional games.
2. Scheduling Sub Committee:
 - a. Coordinate all scheduling.
 - b. Submit and email final schedules to chair.
 - c. Serve as a clearinghouse for schools that need games due to dropped programs.
 - d. Secure out of section/state games for teams with byes in their schedule.
3. Officials Coordinating Sub Committee:
 - a. Have representation at the section 3 officiating committee meetings.
 - b. Meet periodically with the three officials' boards to coordinate practices.
 - c. Coordinate official's assignments for sectional and regional games.
4. Kickoff Classic Sub Committee:
 - Coordinate all aspects of the "Kickoff Classic" games
 - Work with scheduling sub-committee to secure opponents
 - Work with National Football Foundation Representative, schools and dome to make financial arrangements.
5. Arcaro Classic Sub Committee:
 - a. Coordinate all aspects of the Arcaro Classic games including:
 - Secure sites.
 - Secure coaches.
 - Coordinate selection of teams.
 - Work with coaches to select practice sites.
 - Communicate game rules with coaches.
 - Submit all proper paperwork.
 - Work with National Football Foundation Representative.

VOTING:

1. The chair will determine the voting method to decide individual issues.
 - a. Democratic Vote of the Full Committee:
 - Used for agenda items when reps have had time to poll those they represent.
 - Each rep in attendance gets one vote.
 - Absent reps lose their vote on that issue if they do not send a sub or contact the chair with their vote.
 - Advisors do not vote.
 - Chair only votes to break ties.

VOTING (Continued):

b. Democratic Vote by Class:

- Used for agenda items when reps have had time to poll those they represent and issue effects only one class with no effect on other classes.
- Each rep in attendance gets one vote.
- Absent reps lose their vote on that issue if they do not send a sub or contact the chair with their vote.
- Chair votes to break ties.

c. Consensus Decision:

- Used to decide issues that have not been discussed in advance.
- Reps in attendance vote their own feelings as to what is best for Section 3 Football.

ADVISOR:

1. To advise the committee as to sectional policies and potential conflicts and finances, etc.
2. May be appointed by the Chairman.
3. May be appointed by the Section 3 President
4. May enter in discussions but has no vote on issues

GUEST:

1. Any Chief School Officer, Athletic Director or Coach may attend a Committee meeting. They may speak only through their conference Representative, unless asked to address the committee by the chairman.

COMMUNICATIONS:

1. Agenda
 - a. Sent to all representatives and advisors two weeks prior to meeting date
 - b. Any business that a representative or anyone else wants on the agenda, other than ordinary business, should be sent to the chairman three weeks before the meeting date if possible
2. Minutes of Meeting
 - a. Sent to all directors by the recording secretary. May be done by way of the Secretary of Section 3 or by email.
 - b. Sent to all committee members by the chairman or if authorize the recording secretary.
 - c. Coach Representatives are responsible to send the minutes to all football coaches in their conference.
3. Representatives
 - a. Should communicate about voting items with all they represent prior to each meeting

FOOTBALL POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

Note: Section 3 football policies and procedures take precedence over all league policies and procedures.

AWARDS:

1. All division champions may be awarded a plaque and individual awards. Each member of divisional champion teams will get a patch. Each member of Section 3 champion teams will be awarded Section 3 Champions patches and banner lines (if requested).
2. All stars. Each division will select an all-star team consisting of thirty (30) first team selections, thirty (30) second team selections, one coach-of-the-year and an undetermined number of honorable mention selections. Specialists must be included in the thirty selections. All first and second team all-stars will be awarded a certificate.

CLASS PLACEMENT (Deadline for submission of forms to chair is Jan. 15th):

1. All schools will be placed in a class according to the State Football Classifications numbers.
2. Schools that feel they cannot compete in their proper class due to program deficiencies may petition to be placed to a lower class by the February 1st deadline. Schools should complete the form on page 27 and submit it to the Football Chairman prior to the realignment meeting each year. It **MUST** be signed by the Chief School Officer and the Athletic Director in order to be valid. Schools must understand that if approved they will not be eligible to participate in divisional and sectional playoffs. The divisional record will be 0–0 and their all-star selections will be based on a last place finish in the division. Each case will be considered on an individual basis and will be reviewed yearly by the Football Committee.

COMBINING OF SCHOOLS:

1. Schools that wish to combine for football must notify the football committee by January 15th and follow all other Section 3 procedures.
2. Schools should understand they will be placed in a division and class that reflect the combined enrollments of the two schools.
3. Schools that decide late to combine after the alignment and schedules are in place will lose all rights of entry into the Section tournament if their combined enrollment places them above the upper limit of their class.

DIVISIONS:

- Divisions will be developed after teams are put into classifications.
- The football committee will develop the divisions from the input of each classification of coaches

EXCEPTIONAL SENIOR GAMES:

The “John Arcaro Memorial Football Classic”. Each Section 3 schools will have at least one *senior* player participate on one of these teams provided their coach nominates player(s) by the deadline date and on the proper form. (Page 25). Players will be informed by the Sunday before the game.

FILMING AND SPOTTER – FACILITIES:

All schools will provide equal height, angle and amount of space at their facility for spotters. Schools will provide equal facilities for opposing filmers in regard to height, angle, shelter, and power (i.e. power provided for home team –it must be provided for visitors). All school must complete the “Section 3 Football Home Facilities Form (Page 22). And mail it to all opponents one week prior to your first contest. Any variations from that form must be mutually agreeable and communicated at least 48 hours prior to the game.

FILMING OF GAMES FOR EXCHANGE – GUIDELINES:

1. All varsity football games must be filmed.
2. All game videos should be DVD (unless otherwise agreed upon) and copies should be made from the original and not from a copy.
3. Coverage should include as many players as possible allowing for differences in press box height and angles.
4. DVD’s should be exchanged at a convenient location no later than Saturday afternoon when both play on or before Friday and Sunday noon if one or both teams play on Saturday.
5. Begin the video when the team breaks the huddle with a wide view so the entire formation and defensive alignment can be easily recognized. Then bring in the picture to include linebackers and running backs. Widen out on pass plays.
6. Let video run until a few seconds after the tackle so players on the tackle can be identified.
7. May not apply to out of section games.

Recommendation:

- a) 3 seconds of the scoreboard or sideline chains clearly showing down and distance should precede each play.
- b) All penalty signals should be on tape.
- c) 5 seconds of black or color bars should separate the halves.

FILMING OF GAMES FOR EXCHANGE – PROCEDURE:

1. Mandated for all games and preseason scrimmages in the regular season and post season, through state playoffs and match ups. The home team Head Coach makes arrangements for the videotape exchange of the two most recent contests unless the coach calls Monday prior to exchange and requests a different game or games. If a film does not come out it is up to that coach to make arrangements with the opposing coach for a copy of their film for exchange purposes. All Friday game videos will be exchanged Saturday by noon and all Saturday game films will be exchanged on Sunday by noon. Coaches should have two copies, on two separate tapes to facilitate exchanges.

FORFEIT PROCEDURE:

1. Once a forfeit situation occurs, the athletic director of that school will notify the President of the Section 3 and the Section 3 Football Chairman stating specific reasons for forfeit.
2. The President of Section III and Football Chairman will confer with the Executive Director to determine effect of a possible forfeit by said team in relation to division standing and post-season play.
3. The Executive Director will then notify each division athletic director concerning the forfeit situation and the effect it will have on conference and post-season play.
4. The Executive Director and Football Chairman will be the contact persons for the media to communicate the facts pertaining to the forfeit in order to eliminate any possibility of incorrect information.
5. In all circumstances dealing with an ineligible player the rules as state in the NYSPHSAA Handbook will be followed.

Note: If a team forfeits a contest, which cannot be played and then continues with their schedule, they must forward their last played game film to their next opponent since there was no opportunity for their next opponent to scout them the week they forfeited.

HEADPHONES: If both teams are using wireless headphones on the same frequency, the home team must change frequency. Neither team can use headphones until the problem is corrected. If it cannot be corrected neither team may use headphones.

JUNIOR VARSITY CONTESTS: Each week all Class AA, and A teams play JV football against the same opponent as the varsity but at opposite sites. Class B, C and D schools may have a separate JV schedule. Athletic Directors will complete JV schedules.

LOCKER ROOMS: Visiting teams will be provided access to a locker room, showers, blackboard and chalk for **pre-game, half-time and post-game.**

MEDICAL SERVICES:

It is recommended that a physician be available at all football games. If a physician cannot be secured then coverage should be provided by person(s) qualified to give emergency care (i.e. physician assistant, certified athletic trainer, emergency squad, etc.).

OFFICIAL BALL FOR STATE TOURNAMENT PLAY:

NYSPPHSAA will designate the official football for state tournament play. All teams reaching the state playoffs will receive a free ball and will be required to use the state approved footballs throughout the state playoffs.

OFFICIALS PRE-SEASON RATING FORM

Each school should have receive an Officials rating form from each of the three chapters (Syracuse, Mohawk, Watertown). It is the Head Coach's responsibility to fill out each form and send it to the appropriate chapter (assignor). See your Athletic Director if you have not received them.

OFFICIALS AND CHAIN CREWS:

1. Varsity games during the regular season will have 4 or 5 officials. (The home team may decide at its own discretion to add a 5th official for their contest. The section 3 football committee and official chapters recommend 5 officials for varsity contests). During all rounds of the Section III playoffs, 5 officials shall be assigned. The JV level will use 4 officials. Modified games will be assigned 3 officials.
2. For Quarterfinal games and 8th week match up games the home team will be responsible for requesting officials and will also provide vouchers and pay officials fees. Note: From Quarterfinals on - five (5) officials will be used, if requested and agreed upon by both schools.
3. For Sectional Semi-Finals and Finals will use five officials: The upper seed team will have three officials from their chapter (Referee, Back Judge, and Linesman), Lower seed team will have two officials (Umpire and Line Judge)
4. For Regional Finals – The officials will be assigned by the same chapter as participating school. In the even years, Section III will provide the officials and chain crew. In the odd years, Section IV will provide the officials and chain crew.
5. For State Semi-Finals and Finals – Officials are assigned by state committee.

**** For varsity games the home team must provide competent adults for the chain crew. If the visiting team requests to have one person on the chain crew it will be granted. For all sectional semi-finals, each team must provide two competent adults for the chain crew. Chain crews will be provided by the officials for sectional and regional finals and all state competition.

OVERTIME:

Overtime procedure as written in the *New York State Handbook* will be used for all varsity games. (See State Handbook)

PASSES:

Each school will receive 10 scouting passes. Only people with Section 3 passes or scouting passes will be admitted free of charge. Schools in need of additional passes should contact the Section 3 office or make arrangements with the home school. Home schools may admit others free if they choose during regular season games.

PLAYOFF PROCEDURE - SITES FOR SECTIONAL SEMI-FINALS AND FINALS:

No team will play a Sectional Semi-Final game on their home field unless mutually agreeable by both schools. The football site committee will determine the site, day and time. All section III finals will be played at a pre-determined site set by the section III football committee.

PLAYOFF PROCEDURE – POINT DIFFERENTIAL RULE:

The tiebreaker criteria, seeding criteria, and wild card criteria described within uses a 25-point *per game* limit when calculating point differentials. This has been done to discourage teams from running up the score and embarrassing an opponent. Differentials are limited to 1st half points.

PLAYOFF PROCEDURE - POSITION MATCHUPS FOR WEEKS 8 and 9

1. Week 8 and 9 – All Classes

- All non-qualifiers for the Section III playoffs will get an 8th week game which will be set up after week 7. Teams choosing to play a 9th game in writing will be set up by the football committee. The committee will consider the following, if possible:

- Give teams new opponents
 - Balance home games
 - Honor school requests
 - Match teams with similar records
 - Avoid excessive travel where possible
- Note: Home teams will pay for officials

*** The JV's will play the same schedule as the varsity through the 8th week.

PLAYOFF PROCEDURE – QUALIFICATION FOR PLAYOFFS:

1. Classes with Two Divisions -

- a. Top four teams from each division after 7 weeks qualify for the Section 3 quarterfinals to be played on week 8. Quarterfinal games will be played at higher seeded team or site TBA by the home team.

2. Classes with Three Divisions -
 - a. After Week 7 the top two from each division plus two of the three third place teams chosen according to **Wild Card Team Criteria** qualify for the Section 3 quarterfinals played during week 8 at a site determined by the higher seeded team.

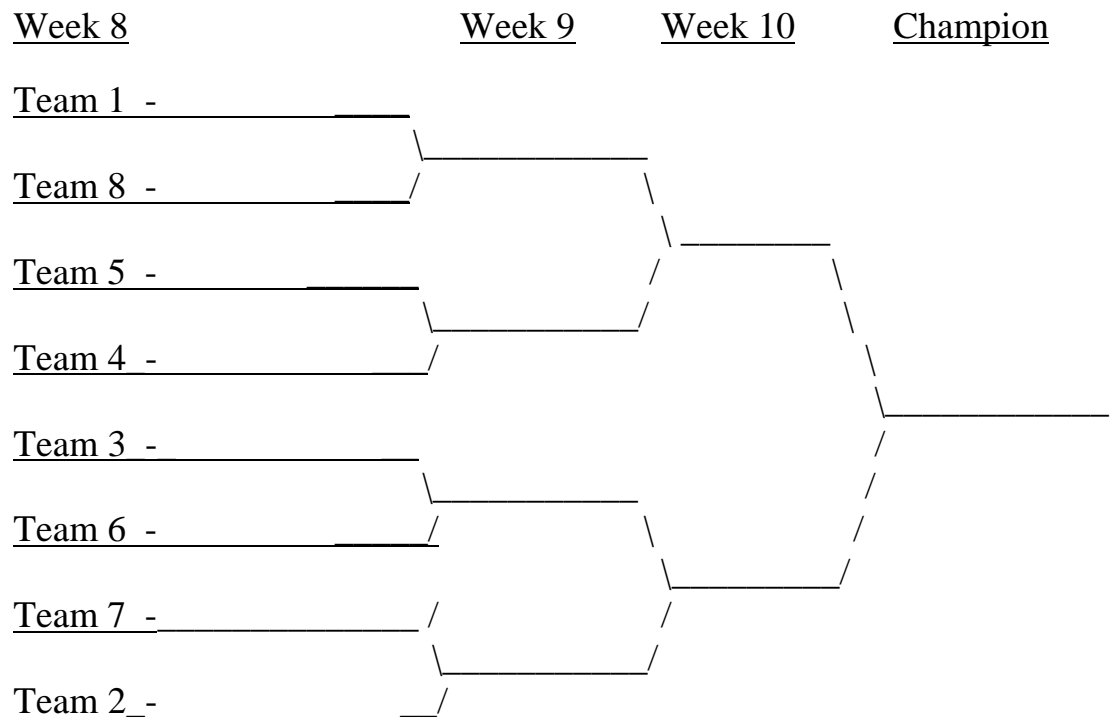
3. Classes with Four Divisions –

Top two teams from each division after week 7 will qualify for the Section 3 playoff to be played on week 8. This round and the quarterfinal games will be played at higher seeded team or site TBA by the home team.

PLAYOFF PROCEDURE – SEEDING OF TEAMS FOR THE SECTION III PLAYOFFS:

1. Classes with Two or Four Divisions
 - A) The two and four division champs will be seeded 1&2 or 1, 2, 3,&4 according to the following criteria:
 - 1st - head to head results, only if all teams have played each other.
 - 2nd fewest losses in the division.
 - 3rd fewest losses vs. like-class opponents
 - 4th best record vs. common opponents
 - 5th flip a coin for two division, draw straws for four divisions

*** If two or more teams are tied for a place, return to step 1.a, of this tiebreaker procedure, as soon as one team has been advanced into a place.
 - B) The classes with two divisions will fill out the championship brackets as follows: the four teams from the top seeded team’s division will be teams 1, 3, 5 & 7 in the bracket according to their league finish, first through 4th. The four teams from the second seeded team’s division will be 2, 4, 6 & 8. Classes with four divisions will fill out the championship brackets as follows: The divisional champs will be seeded 1, 2, 3 & 4. The second place teams will be seeded opposite their division champion as follows: The second place team of the number 1 seed will be seeded 6th, the second place team of the number 2 seed will be seeded 5th, the second place team of the number 3 seed will be seeded 8th, and the second place team of the number 4 seed will be seeded 7th.
 - C) The upper seed is the home team (jersey color and sideline).



2. Classes with Three Divisions
 - a. Section 3-quarter finals will be played week 8 at the site of the higher seed. For the quarterfinals the three division champs will be seeded 1, 2, and 3. The following criteria will be used to rank the three champion teams:
 - 1st - head to head results, only if all teams have played each other.
 - 2nd - fewest losses vs. like-class opponents
 - 3rd - best record vs. common opponents.
 - 4th - flip a coin.
3. Of the three-second place teams, the team whose champ is seeded #1 will automatically be the 6th seed. The two-second place teams whose champs are the 2nd or 3rd seed will be either the 4th or 5th seed. The two teams will be seeded 4th or 5th according to the above steps 1 through 4, but if one was a co-champion of their division they will get the 4th seed. The two 3rd place (Wild Card) teams will be seeded 7 and 8 to avoid their division champs in the first round if possible.

PLAYOFF PROCEDURE - TIE BREAKER (for determining division standings):

1. Teams in all classes and all divisions are placed in order by the least number of losses of division games. If two or more teams are tied for a place, return to step 1.a, of this tiebreaker procedure, as soon as one or more teams have been advanced into a place. The highest seed available will be assigned to the first team that is advanced by this tiebreaker procedure:
 - a. Head to head results of all game(s) among all tied teams.
 - b. The team with the highest point differential in the first half vs. all tied opponents advances (points scored in the first half minus points allowed in the first half with a maximum of 25 points difference *per contest*) provided all tied teams played each other. If two teams are tied for the highest point differential (in a three or more way tie) both teams advance and return to step 1.a, of this tiebreaker procedure, to break this tie. All coaches are responsible for reporting their point differential to their rep. before the seeding meeting.
 - c. The team with the highest point differential in the first half vs. all common division opponents (points scored in the first half minus points allowed in the first half with a maximum of 25 point difference *per contest*) will advance. If two teams are tied for the highest point differential (in a three or more way tie) both teams advance and return to step 1.a, of this tiebreaker procedure, to break this tie. All coaches are responsible for reporting their point differential to their rep. before the seeding meeting.
 - d. Fewest points allowed in the first half among all tied opponents provided that they all played each other. If two teams are tied for the fewest points allowed (in a three or more way tie) both teams advance and return to step 1.a, of this tiebreaker procedure, to break this tie.
 - e. The team with the fewest *total* points allowed in the first half vs. all common division opponents advance. If two teams are tied for the fewest points allowed (in a three or more way tie) both teams

advance and return to step 1.a, of this tiebreaker procedure, to break this tie.

- f. Coin toss (2 teams) or draw straws (3 or more teams) to advance one team. The remaining teams return to step 1.a, of this tiebreaker procedure.

Forfeit note - If a team benefits from a forfeit during the season involving a team that is not in the tie, all games against that team are disregarded in the *step “c” and step “e” in above “Tie Breaker”*. If the forfeit involves teams that are in the tie, all steps apply with all games considered.

PLAYOFF PROCEDURE - WILD CARD TEAM CRITERIA: (Continued)

(Used to determine the final two-playoff qualifiers in a class with three divisions when quarterfinals are played)

1. Note: if any team advances after applying any step in this Wild Card Procedure, revert back to step 1.a, of this Wild Card Procedure, with the remaining teams. Only third place finishers will be considered after applying the Breaker Criteria from previous page.
 - a. A team advances if it has beaten one of the other third place teams.
 - b. Least number of losses vs. divisional opponents.
 - c. Record versus common opponents among all tied teams
 - d. Team with the highest average point differential in the first half vs. all division opponents advances (points scored in the first half minus points allowed in the first half with a maximum of 25 points). If two teams are tied with the highest average differential both teams advance.
 - e. Team with the fewest average points given up in the first half vs. all teams in their division advances. If two teams are tied, with the fewest points given up, they both advance.
 - f. Team with the highest average point differential in the first half vs. all common opponents advances (points scored in the first half minus points allowed in the first half with a maximum of 25 points). If two teams are tied with the highest average differential both teams advance.
 - g. Team with the fewest average points given up in the first half vs. all common opponents advances. If two teams are tied with the fewest points given up, they both advance.
 - h. Flip a coin (2 teams) or Draw straws (3 teams).

PRE SEASON PRACTICE GUIDELINES:

1. Modified Football
 - a. First 3 days - Non-contact without protective pads, blocking sleds and other blocking and tackling devices. Limited to helmets, mouth guard, T-shirt, supporter, shorts, ankle supports, socks, shoes protective pads for elbow and/or knee areas.

PRE SEASON PRACTICE GUIDELINES (Con't):

- b. Next 5 days (4-8)– Contact period. Contact is allowed with Shoulder pads, along with the use of blocking dummies, sleds and other similar teaching and training devices is permissible. No scrimmages or live contact drills are allowed.
 - c. Next 5 days (9-13) consist of contact with full protective equipment and the use of training devices. Teams may scrimmage with another school on the 14th day.
 - d. Next 4 days (14-17) – Four additional days of contact prior to the first contest.
 - e. Total days required is 17 team and individual practices prior to the first contest. All individuals must complete 8 days of practice prior to contact drills.
2. Varsity and JV Football
- a. First 2 days – Non-contact period with out protective pads, blocking sleds and other blocking and tackling devices. Helmets may be worn.
 - b. Next 3 days – Readiness period – Shoulder pads blocking and tackling dummies and sleds may be added but still no contact drills or scrimmages are allowed.
 - c. Next 6 days – Contact period. Full contact with full protective padding. Teams may scrimmage with another school on 12th day.
 - d. Next 4 days – Interschool period. Four additional days of contact.
 - e. Total days required is 15 team and individual practices prior to the first contest. All individuals must complete 5 days of practice prior to contact drills.

PROTEST PROCEDURE:

1. The following Section 3 football policy and procedures take precedence over all league policies and procedures.
 - a. All protests must be made in writing to the football chairperson before the close of the next school day.
 - b. All protests must be signed by the Athletic Director and Secondary School Principal or Chief School Officer.
 - c. Games successfully challenged under protest can be picked up at the point of protest or played over, but in either case the four night rest rule applies.
 - d. A standing committee made up of the protest committee chairman plus an Athletic Director representative from each of the five classes will hear protest. A list of the members of the protest committee are: Chair-Tom Tatham, AA-George Mangicarro, A-Tom Schoen, B-Mike Byrnes, C-John Manion, D-Chris Connolly
 - e. When a hearing is held the Reps. from the class of the teams involved in the protest will not vote.

PROCEDURE FOR ADDRESSING VIOLATIONS OF FB COMMITTEE'S POLICIES OR OBLIGATIONS:

1. A school must file a written complaint against another school before any action can take place. The school's athletic director and head football coach must sign said complaint. The complaint should go first to the coaching representative of that football division, and the league's athletic director representative.
2. For minor first-time offenses the representative will call the athletic director of the offending school to try to resolve the issue.
3. If the representative cannot resolve the issue or feels it is of such magnitude that it must go to a higher authority he will inform The Section 3 Football Chairman and pass along the written complaint.
4. The football chair will communicate with the Section 3 Executive Director who will consult with the Section 3 President. If deemed appropriate, the Executive Director will write a letter to the offending school demanding their written reply and compliance.
5. If the problem continues or, the school shows a pattern of repeated violations of committee policies, or if the single issue is deemed of serious enough nature, a hearing will be convened to hear the complaint and consider sanctions against the school's football program. The hearing panel will consist of the football chair and the assistant chairs. The Section 3 President and Executive Director will be invited as observers as well as the AD representatives and football coaching representatives of the leagues/divisions of the offending school and the school that filed the complaint.
6. The hearing panel will then issue a report to the Section 3 Executive Committee that may recommend sanctions against the offending school.
7. If the Executive Committee approves the sanctions, said sanctions will be communicated and implemented by the Executive Committee. Hearings will be conducted according to procedures defined in the Section 3 handbook (page P-18b)
8. Possible sanctions, depending on the severity of the infraction(s) could include one or more of the following, or other such sanctions:
 - a. Loss of a home contest or contests
 - b. Loss of opportunity to play in the Kickoff Classic games
 - c. Forfeiture of a contest or multiple contests
 - d. Loss of privilege of participating in the Sectional Tournament

ROSTERS, SCHEDULES AND HOME FACILITIES FORM:

1. One week prior to the first contest all schools must send the following items to all opponents. (Bring completed information to the preseason coaches meeting)
 - a. Rosters must be in **numerical jersey order only (lowest jersey # to highest jersey #)** and must include last name, first name, height, weight, position, and grade.
 - b. Schedule will include all dates and starting times for all of your games
 - c. The Football Home Facilities Form must be completed and mailed.
2. Coaches should notify future opponents of roster changes.

SCHEDULING: The scheduling of divisions and games will be done by the football committee. The representatives from all classes will meet with their coaches and bring suggested divisions and schedules for committee approval. Divisions will be developed with “least amount” of change every odd year. On the even years, realignment of the entire classification can be discussed. This procedure coordinates with the movement of private schools and classification changes with the state. The football committee will make all final decisions on divisions and scheduling. *Each school will be placed for participate based on last year’s situation. Ex. – if your school had varsity football last year, they will have varsity this year. If you did not field a varsity last year, you will not be considered to have a varsity team. The dateline to change your intention will be February 1st. If you are considering combining with another school, see “combining of schools.”*

Class AA Divisions – Will realign every even year by taking the league record of the most recent four years and rank ordering the teams by winning percentage. The division will be developed using the “S” formation to determine the two divisions. (Passed by all schools 12-0 vote, schools involved: Auburn, Baldwinsville, CBA, Central Square, CNS, Corcoran, FM, Henninger, Liverpool, Rome, Utica, and West Genesee)

Class A Divisions (See page 37) – Will realign every even year by placing all American and National “chartered” schools in their appropriate divisions. The movement of schools will be decided by the following:

- New schools moving into Class A will be placed in the voided spot.
- Order of movement – Fowler, Jamesville-Dewitt, ESM, Nottingham, Chittenango

All other classes will make divisions at their pre-season meetings.

SCHEDULE COMMITMENTS:

Failure to honor competition commitments made up by the Section 3 Football Committee for varsity and Junior Varsity will invoke forfeiture by the offending school, and exclusion from post-season competition for their varsity team during the next sports season. A school is exempted if the decision is mutually agreeable by both schools for 9th and 10th games, or the circumstances are beyond the control of the school (i.e. numbers fall below **16** due to injuries, suspensions, etc.)

SCOUTING OF SCRIMMAGES:

It is permitted to scout only your first game opponent.

STATISTICS:

Varsity coaches are responsible for sending or calling your weekly statistics to your coaching rep or to a designated division statistician after each contest. Those statistics **MUST** include points scored by each team in each quarter, and should also include stats of interest to local papers such as yards rushing, passing, receiving, etc.

SUSPENDED GAME (S):

Games suspended due to events beyond the officials or game management control (weather, etc) shall be continued as early as the next day from the point of interruption unless the teams agree to terminate the game with the existing score. The “seven day” rule, though, must be followed (no games or practices allowed on seven consecutive days).

TEAM MINIMUM NUMBERS

The minimum number of eligible suited players must be 16

TWO SPORT ATHLETES

No athlete may play football and another school fall sport at the same time. In addition the NYSPHSAA has ruled that football players must be eligible to compete in at least 3 regular season contests in order to play in sectional or state competition.

VIDEO SCOUTING

Teams are allowed to use videotaping as an approved method of scouting opponents for all games during the regular season and during the playoffs. Teams may also videotape while scouting the scrimmage of their first game opponent only. Schools are **NOT** obligated to make any special arrangements for video scouting (i.e. special areas, power, etc.)

WARM-UP AND PRE GAME PROCEDURES:

Each team will have a minimum of ½ field for warm-ups for 30 minutes (may be 20 minutes during playoffs in the Dome). Home team will choose their end for warm-ups. If there is a special event prior to kickoff (bands, etc.) the home team must contact the visiting team 48 hours in advance with time schedule of when they have to be off the field prior to contests to accommodate the special event.

Football Home Facilities Form

Must be mailed to all opponents one week prior to your first game with your schedule and roster.

Section III football bylaws say:

All schools will provide equal height, angle and amount of space at their facility for Spotters. School will provide equal facilities for opposing Filmers in regard to height, angle, shelter, and power (i.e. if power is available for the home team it must also be available for the visitors.) All schools must complete the Section III Football Home Facilities Form and mail it to all opponents on week prior to your first contest. Any variations from this form must be mutually agreeable and communicated at least 48 hours prior to the game.

RE: Minutes from March 6th League Meeting on Alignment Philosophy

Based upon the recommendation by the Section III Football Committee regarding the draft results of the June 2007 Class A league meeting, the Section III Football Committee recommended that Class A meet again to discuss and finalize the American/National Class A Conference formula.

As a result of this recommendation a meeting was held at East Syracuse Minoa High School on March 6, 2008 at 6:00 pm. Participants at this meeting were Athletic Directors, Coaches, Bob Campese the Section III Football Chairperson, and Todd Nelson the Section III Boys Sports Representative to the Athletic Council. The following is the finalized agreement for Class A American/National league alignment philosophy beginning in the re-alignment year of Fall 2009.

Class A League Alignment Philosophy:

In years where there are two or more schools in the American Conference than there are in the National Conference the American Conference will rotate one or more (whatever is necessary for balance) of its schools to the National Conference. The rotating of the American Conference schools will come from the identified “Core Cluster” schools. “Core Cluster” is identified as the schools that lie closest to the NYS Thruway. The “Core Cluster” schools were determined to be Fowler, Jamesville-DeWitt, East Syracuse Minoa and Nottingham. The rotation was determined by a blind draw resulting in the order listed in the previous sentence. Each school will rotate to the National Division for a two-year period beginning in the 2009 re-alignment year. At the end of the two years that school will return to the American Conference and go to the back of the rotation.

The following provisions are for schools that enter Class A due to relief or enrollment change. Any new school that enters Class A will automatically go to the top of the rotation and be placed in the National Division for two years. At the end of two years that school will become a permanent member in the American Conference unless the school is identified as a “Core Cluster” school. If the change is on an even year (non-re-alignment), this school will serve one year then go back to the top of the cycle and serve their two years.

Example: Chittenango is a “Core Cluster” school and would become part of the regular rotation.

Example: Oswego is not a “Core Cluster” school and would become a permanent member of the American Conference and not have to serve another rotation.

If the new entrants to Class A were naturally National Conference schools they would then be placed in the National Conference.

Example: Indian River considering their proximity to Carthage, Watertown and Camden.

Example: Oneida considering they have always been a National Conference school any time they have been in Class A.

If two schools enter the American Conference in the same year and are not considered “Core Cluster” schools they will both go to the top of the rotation list and serve a two-year rotation to the National Conference. The order in which the schools rotate will be determined by a blind draw.

In any year where the natural order of schools favors the National Conference and there are two or more schools in this conference then the same philosophy will apply to balance out the American Conference. If and when this is necessary we will do a blind draw to determine the order of the rotation of schools.

Kevin DeParde (ESM Coach) made the motion to adopt this as the Class A alignment philosophy this motion was seconded by Ken Avery (Fulton Athletic Director). The discussion took place and the roll call vote yielded a unanimous decision in adopting this philosophy.
