Every child has special gifts that build the diverse foundation of a school district!



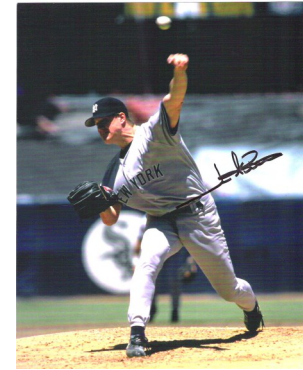
